A Word from the Minister

Dr. Lawrence Hutchison
Retires as Clerk of Session

Early this calendar year, Dr. Lawrence Hutchison made known to the Kirk Session his intention to step down as Clerk. This news was received regretfully. However, we understand that after considerable years of diligent service, his wishes ought to be respected. We are immensely grateful to him for his dedication and consistency.

Dr. Lawrence Hutchison was baptized in St. Paul's Church by Dr. Donald, and so we might say that his connection to this congregation goes back a ways. While Dr. Hutchison grew up and went to Church School at Dominion Douglas, his marriage to Lois brought him back to this Church (thank you, Lois). He has contributed in so many ways to this congregation. He was ordained in 1970 by Dr. Berlis, and since that time has served on many committees and special project groups over 38 years.

His leadership and contribution to St. Andrew's Homes – as member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Homes, Inc., St. Andrew's Homes Foundation, and as the Chair of the Unified Board – has taken much time and done immense good for that organization.

Since November of 1991, Dr. Hutchison has been our Clerk of Session. In the official minutes of the Session you can tell when he took over – the minutes begin to be typed, and eventually put on computer. He also served many years organizing our services of Holy Communion. Together with Lois Hutchison, Robert Koffend and Marigold Hyde, this task, which is considerable, has been computerized and colour coded so that elders know where to sit and whom to serve and the service goes ahead with great reverence.

In his capacity as Clerk, Dr. Hutchison has provided wise and gentle guidance and served as confidant to two ministers – Reverend Doctor James Armour and myself – both of whom have valued his good judgment and compassionate manner. Dr. Hutchison was also an ex officio member of every search committee of this congregation over 17 years during which his contributions served to guide us to wonderful candidates for congregational leadership.

His integrity is much respected by the whole of the Session and of the congregation. His laughter (which can be heard in the halls of our Church during communion preparation) is infectious and his good humour is a gift to us - as is the amount of time Dr. Hutchison has invested in the good of this Church in his days of so-called "retirement." It is with much pleasure and gratitude to God that we say thank you to Dr. Hutchison for 17 years as our Clerk of Session. He will continue to serve on the Session.

Beginning October 2008, Miss Judith Mowat will take up the responsibilities of Clerk of Session. Mr. Bruce Bolton has agreed to serve as Deputy Clerk of Session. Lawrence, we are grateful to God for the outstanding service and dedication you have given to this Church.

Ask, and you shall receive. So we believe. Ask and it shall be given unto you. It is this spirit that informs our emerging focus on the spiritual significance of Stewardship in our programming for the next year. Stewardship isn't just about money. Dictionaries define it as the act of managing: affairs, buildings, estates, restaurants, and wine cellars. Stewardship of the land leads to crops, of animals to flocks, of investments to returns. Stewardship is always a sound investment because the ultimate return is always increase. Think of the loaves and fishes.

The Sinfonica Organo recital series will return this year as well, with a marathon organ recital by Jonathan Oldengarm on the afternoon of Sunday, September 28 (in conjunction with the annual Orgues Ouvertes / Journées de la Culture event).

From the Archives

The Early Ministers of St. Paul's Church

In the last issue of *InsideOut* I mentioned the stained glass windows in the narthex, and in particular the one dedicated to Reverend Alexander Mathieson and his wife, Catherine Elizabeth McKenzie, that came from St. Andrew's Church. In this issue, I would like to consider some of the windows in other parts of the Church that came originally from St. Paul's Church or The Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul on Dorchester St. and that are dedicated to other former ministers of the church, particularly the one in honour of the Reverend James Barclay.

In contrast to St. Andrew's Church which had only two stained glass windows, St. Paul's Church had thirteen such windows, five of which were installed during the ministry of the Reverend John Jenkins (1865-1881) and eight during the ministry of Reverend James Barclay (1883-1910). All of these windows have been transferred to our present Church.

The first two ministers of St. Paul's Church were Reverend Edward Black, from 1832 to 1845, and Reverend Robert McGill, from 1845 to 1856. There is a stained glass window in memory of Dr. Black in the little room to the east of the chancel at the north end of the sanctuary, as well as a memorial tablet recording his ministry high up in the narthex that can be seen only by standing with one's back to the coat rack at the east end of the narthex. The window in honour of Dr. McGill is in the corridor at the top of the stairs leading from the sanctuary to the minister's study. Both of these windows are quite alike and their similarity suggests that they were made locally by the same firm, possibly J.C. Spence & Co. Each of these windows has two lights or panels with decorative patterns forming knotted heart-shaped motifs. These contain stylized foliage of various colours and have red or blue backgrounds surrounded by a border of vines and berries or orange lilies.

These two windows dedicated to Dr. McGill and Dr. Black and installed in St. Paul's Church in 1870 and 1879 respectively, are both quite modest or restrained, in line with the Calvinist tradition of avoiding "graven images." They were originally twice their present size with large quatrefoils, but they have since been reduced

substantially and the quatrefoils removed. One of the quatrefoils is in the minister's study.

The fourth minister of St. Paul's Church was Dr. John Jenkins. Regrettably, there is no window dedicated to Dr. Jenkins in the Church today, although there is a plaque in his memory in the narthex, and a window in memory of his first wife, Harietta, in the sanctuary. St. Paul's Church on Dorchester St. was actually a monument to Dr. Jenkins because it was during his ministry that the Church moved there from St. Helen's St. in 1868.

The fifth minister of St. Paul's Church was Dr. James Barclay. Dr. Barclay came from Scotland. He was a magnificent preacher and was summoned from Canada on three occasions to preach at Balmoral in the presence of

Queen Victoria. He was a man of many parts. He was the chaplain of the Montreal Garrison Artillery and accompanied them on the military expedition to the Red River Rebellion in 1885. He was a leader in education and served on the Protestant Board of School Commissioners for many years, including a term as chairman. He was also President of Trafalgar School for Girls and chairman of its Board of Governors for practically the whole period from 1884 to 1917. On account of his work in education, he was awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) by McGill University in 1906. He was an exponent of "Muscular Christianity." He was a cricketer, curler and golfer. He was a skilled athlete and a delightful companion in all of these sports. He was the chaplain at different times of both the Royal Montreal and Thistle Curling Clubs. He was one of Montreal's first golfers when the members of the Royal Montreal Golf Club played golf on Fletcher's Field before moving to Dixie in 1896. He was captain and

president of the club from 1891-1892 and he was club champion four times between 1886 and 1891.

The Barclay Memorial Window on the west aisle at the back of the sanctuary was made by the firm of J. Ballantine & Co. of Edinburgh, Scotland. It was the last window to be installed in The Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul on Dorchester St. in 1925. This window was dedicated to the loving memory of Dr. Barclay "in public recognition of his broad humanity, his educational leadership, his spiritual vision and religious charity." When it was transferred to our present Church in 1932, it had to be reduced in size to fit within a smaller space. The three lower panels were removed and used together with other stained glass to form a composite window on the east wall of the chapel beside the window dedicated to Samuel Greenshields.

Two quatrefoils and a trefoil at the top of the window were also removed and used as decorative elements in the plain glazing of the clerestory windows from 1932 until 1962 or later when the new series of clerestory windows were installed. The two quatrefoils representing a cross and an anchor respectively, were later donated to The Little Metis Presbyterian Church at Metis-sur-mer on the occasion of its 100th birthday in 1983, and the trefoil representing the burning bush is today still in the minister's study.

This beautiful window is composed of three panels reflecting important aspects of Dr. Barclay's life and work. The left-hand panel depicts his interest in education with the figure of a teacher standing before his students holding a scroll of Greek text; in the centre panel is the figure of a preacher representing his spiritual vision; and in the right-hand panel is a young athlete holding a discus and about to receive the laurel crown of victory. At the top of the panels are figures named from left to right for Faith, Charity and Hope, the three Christian virtues noted in 1 Corinthians 13: 13.

The text below the panels reflects the Messianic hope of the prophet Isaiah: "The spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the Lord" (Isaiah 11: 2).

The Barclay window is lit by artificial light from the vestibule inside the door from the porte cochère so that it can be seen in the sanctuary.

Dear Jim,

We learned recently that you will be shortly celebrating your 50th year as an ordained minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Personally, and as Clerk of Session of The Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, I would like to congratulate you heartily for such a remarkable length of active and invaluable service to your Church.

We remember with great pride and pleasure your 15 years of outstanding and faithful service as our Senior Minister. We still frequently hear comments from our members about the fine sermons, delivered with such clarity, and of your wonderful stories told at our Christmas Eve services. It was during your time that these services became widely known throughout the Christian community in Montreal, resulting in a full Church every Christmas. All of us remember the many kindnesses and the thoughtful attention you showed to your parishioners, many of whom became close personal friends. Our

Church prospered greatly during the time of your leadership. When other churches were losing membership, we continued to gain in numbers and in Church and outreach activities. You left a strong and united congregation, which has continued to prosper as a result of your remarkable leadership. Despite your concerns about continuing your association with the Church as Minister Emeritus following your retirement as our Senior Minister, I am so very pleased that we were able to persuade you to do so. You have helped us through so many occasions when Dr. Topping was on holiday or on study leave while completing his thesis for a doctorate of philosophy. I know how exceptionally grateful he is to you for making this possible.

You have continued to give invaluable service to the Presbytery of Montreal by serving as Interim Moderator at a number of churches in the Montreal area. This work has saved churches that would have otherwise been lost. I am certain they are also most grateful to you.

I would be neglectful if I failed to comment on the wonderful contribution that your wife, Margaret, made to so many of the Church organizations. It was also a pleasure to see your children at Church. I am sure they are all very proud of you.

We continue to enjoy seeing you and Margaret at Church and to have your continued support as our Minister Emeritus. We all wish you and Margaret many more years of health and happiness in your service to the greater church.
