
The Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul was built in 1931-32. Two congregations, St. Andrew's founded in 1803, and St. Paul's founded in 1832, joined together in 1919. This is the Regimental Church of The Black Watch (Royal Highland Regiment) of Canada, whose colours hang in the sanctuary. The church organ is a four-manual 1932 Casavant (completely rebuilt in 2000) with 112 ranks and 7000 pipes spread over eight divisions, located in the chancel and the gallery.

## About this morning's choral and organ music...

Matthias Weckmann (ca. 1618-1674) studied with Heinrich Schütz in Dresden, before moving to Hamburg where he studied with the Sweelinck pupil Jacob Praetorius. Through his teachers he had direct knowledge of the Italian polychoral and North German styles; he was a personal friend of Johann Jakob Froberger, who was a noted exponent of the French Classical school. Weckmann incorporated these diverse influences into his own rich compositional language, composing extensively in the chamber music and keyboard genres. Weckmann was organist of Hamburg's prestigious Jakobikirche 1655 until his death.

Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina's music is widely considered the highest achievement of the polyphonic school of composition, and served as the pre-eminent model for nearly all of his successors. In contrast to music of the 18th century and later, the emphasis is on the independence and elegance of each voice's line rather than the vertical harmonic structure; however, the sum of those perfectly-formed lines is always a correct and pleasing sonority.

The American composer **Richard Burchard** is associate professor and composer-in-residence at Bellarmine University. His oeuvre includes 50 choral works that have been performed worldwide. *Sitivit anima mea* uses a macaronic (i.e. multi-lingual) psalm text, opening with a Gregorian chant quote. The first full choral entry is richly homophonic, and reminiscent much of today's choral writing; the writing becomes more animated and pictorial at the text "Who will give me wings", before finding its rest at the close.

**Dietrich Buxtehude** (1637-1707) was the organist and treasurer (!) of the prestigious St. Mary's Church in Lübeck, one of the wealthy North German Hanseatic League cities. His reputation as a performer and composer drew the young J. S. Bach to walk 250 km, in order to learn from the great master. Praeludia for organ are multi-sectional, contrasting recit-like passages with stricter fugal sections. The **Praeludium in e minor**, **BuxWV 142** is one of Buxtehude's later works, and has an aura of great solemnity. The first fugue contains some of the most expressive chromaticism in the composer's oeuvre, and the final fugue is a gigue of cosmic proportions. -JO

# News from the Twinning sub-committee of Mission & Outreach


