The Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul was built in 1931-32. Two congregations, St. Andrew's founded in 1803, and St. Paul's founded in 1832, joined together in 1919. This is the Regimental Church of The Black Watch (Royal Highland Regiment) of Canada, whose colours hang in the sanctuary. The church organ is a four-manual 1932 Casavant (completely rebuilt in 2000) with 112 ranks and 7000 pipes spread over eight divisions, located in the chancel and the gallery.

About this morning's organ and choral music...

William Kraushaar is a promising Montreal composer, and is also a professional singer in our Choir. This morning's introit sets the first line of the Song of Simeon, the Nunc dimittis, sung when the aging Simeon first saw the infant Jesus presented in the temple, in fulfilment of God's ancient promise.

Ralph Vaughan Williams is one of the greatest English composers and teachers of the 20th century. In *Lord, thou hast been our refuge*, he juxtaposes two quintessentially English vocal genres: the hymn and Anglican chant. The text of Psalm 91 (90) is set to music that strongly evokes that half-sung, half-spoken, intoned

psalmody that is a great innovation of the English Cathedral tradition; underneath this, another choir implacably sings Isaac Watts' classic hymn (found at no. 87 in our Book of Praise).

Maurice Duruflé (1902-84) was arguably the last of the great line of French Symphonic organist-composers, an artistic golden age that began with César Franck (1822-1890). Duruflé's oeuvre is small - only around a dozen works - but each one is of the highest quality. The *Suite*, op. 5, wears its majestic symphonic pedigree proudly, particularly in the brooding *Prélude* and bravura *Toccata*, as its grand, bell-like theme rings out in the pedal. -JO

This morning we are joined by students of McGill University's **historical brass** studio, who will play the prelude and choral introit on valveless trumpets, i.e. the kinds of instruments commonly played in the 17th and 18th centuries. The sound tends to be more focussed and vocal than the modern instruments, and the tuning of individual notes is achieved only by the player's embouchure and air pressure, requiring a high degree of skill and control. The trumpets played this morning are based on historical models, but are being played in public for the first time today - they are the masterful work of Aron Vajna, of Basel, Switzerland.

The McGill historical brass studio is led by Alexis Basque, who also plays and records regularly with Montréal's most active and innovative early music ensembles. He is active on the modern trumpet as well, holding principal trumpet positions with the Orchestre symphonique du Saguenay-Lac-St-Jean and with the Orchestre symphonique de Trois-Rivières.

Next in music at St. Andrew and St. Paul...

Nathaniel Watson, of our choir, and of the Schulich School of Music Voice Faculty, will present Franz Schubert's song cycle, *Winterreise*, in Kildonan Hall, **Thursday evening, November 7, at 7:30 p.m.**, accompanied by Prof. Michael McMahon, who is a veteran of many winter journeys. Nat made his professional debut in New York in 1982 in a recital of Bach arias at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. He has known these songs for 40 years, and has sung the other Schubert cycles while living in New York, having received coaching from the great Hermann Prey, among others, but this will be a first-time scaling of this mountain in its entirety; an informal recital run-through, offered free of charge, in preparation for a Faculty Recital a week later at McGill, just before the snow starts flying. The performance will last 70 minutes. Members of the congregation and members of the choir are cordially invited to attend.



An Altar in the World
