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## Music in Worship: Lenten Chapel Service, March 26, 2020

**Johann Sebastian Bach** (1685-1750) assembled Part I of his *Well-Tempered Clavier*, a collection of 24 preludes and fugues in all major and minor keys, in 1722. According to the title page, collection was “for the profit and use of musical youth desirous of learning, and especially for the pastime of those already skilled in this study.” A second volume followed around 20 years later. The first **Prelude in C major** is an iconic work, and was made famous in its adaptation in the 19th century (with newly-composed melody) as the *Ave Maria*, by Charles Gounod. The premise of the piece is simple: an elegant harmonic progression is realized through a repeating arpeggiated pattern, but in Bach’s hands the result is magical.

**Johannes Brahms** (1833-1897) composed his op. 117 **Intermezzi** near the end of his life. There is a sense of “last testament” about the set, in which one of the Romantic era’s greatest composers distills a lifetime of experience, joy and sorrow into five minutes of a simple yet profound lullaby. Brahms gives a quote from Herder’s poetry at the heading of the piece: “*Sleep softly, my child, sleep softly and beautifully! It pains me to behold your tears.*”
